UK Research and Innovation

<u>Culture & Heritage Capital Research Call</u> with Arts and Humanities Research Council

This is a call for applications for funding to undertake research that will help develop a robust and holistic approach for capturing and articulating **the value** of culture and heritage.

The research will play a major role in developing and realising the <u>DCMS</u>

<u>Culture and Heritage Capital Programme</u>. The research opportunity has been separated into several strands each comprising a distinct research question. The call will push the boundaries of economic methodology.

Strand A: developing a taxonomy of cultural and heritage capital services (associated stocks and flows)

Strand B: developing the link between methodologies that can measure why people value culture and heritage and economic techniques that can monetise value

Strand C: defining and incorporating non-use values into social cost-benefit analysis and cultural and heritage capital accounting

Strand D: combining heritage science and economic valuation to articulate better the impact of care and sustainable usage of heritage assets

Strand E: overlaps between natural capital and culture and heritage capital **Strand F:** triangulation of values using different valuation methods, research testing biases and ways to minimise them

Strand G: valuation of digital assets

Applicants must be based at a UK research organisation eligible for UK Research and Innovation (UKRI) funding.

While the call is economics focused it requires an interdisciplinary team of researchers to develop an approach to articulate the cultural, economic and social value of the culture and heritage sectors. The total value of the fund is £3.125m.
